

Extensions can take your locks from Z-list to A-list in an afternoon, but what type is best for your hair and how can you be sure you're going to love your new look? Read on...

air extensions have become an essential part of the celebrity 'grooming' regime. With the ever-increasing demand for stars to reinvent themselves, celebrities need a quick, easy way to change their looks without constant restyling, colouring or 'growing out' pains! When applied well, hair extensions can make your own hair look thicker or longer or they can be used to add in a totally different colour in an instant. However, if applied badly they can look dreadful and can even damage your hair. So here's our essential guide to getting them right - what to look out for, where to go to get them done and a who's who in the hair extensions world...

What are hair extensions?

They are individual pieces of hair either real or synthetic - that are attached to your own hair at the roots.

How are they put in?

If synthetic they are woven in and heat-sealed. If they are real hair they are melted or glued onto your hair.

How do they match your hair colour?

With synthetic hair, the operator will blend several colours together in order to get an exact match when you go for your appointment – they can match to any hair colour. Real hair extensions are generally matched by sending off a piece of your natural hair and having the extensions dyed accordingly.

How long do they last? Generally for between three to four

months - when treated with care Will they damage your own natural hair?

If applied too tightly or if too much hair is used in the individual extensions, making it too heavy for the real hair, then you can get traction alopecia – a condition which causes hair loss due to too much tension in the hair. You can also suffer from matting at the roots of your hair if you neglect your extensions or leave them in for too long.

How do you look after them?

If you have synthetic hair extensions they need very little styling. You cannot use conventional straighteners or tongs on them as they will melt, however, blowdrying as usual or using heated rollers is fine. No special products are necessary, but Prostyles Daily

Conditioning Spray, £4.25, is an excellent way of keeping them looking shiny and smooth. Real hair extensions need to be well conditioned to maintain the condition of the hair and should be styled like natural hair. Use products that are extra nourishing and conditioning.

How much do they cost?

Prices do vary and are dependant on how many extensions you want, how long you want them and also which type of extensions you would prefer. Real hair extensions tend to be pricier than synthetic.

How are they removed?

Synthetic hair extensions can be easily removed by breaking the heat seal and 'un-weaving' the extension. Real hair ones need a solvent to remove them – so should always be done professionally.

We asked Hair Extensions specialists Mark Glenn Hair Enhancement in Mayfair for their top dos and don'ts when considering having hair extensions...

Just as if you are having a haircut, ensure that you have a consultation and take in photos of hairstyles or hair extensions that you like... and those you don't!

Ask to see examples of work that the specialist has done before - it is important to get a good operator.


Always heed your operator's advice on aftercare.

Never leave your extensions in for too long – this can cause matting at the roots.

Do book in for your sixweek up-keep appointment - it will help your extensions last their full life.

Never comb your hair once you have your extensions in - use a bristle brush. This will ensure that you don't accidentally pull out or loosen any of the bonds.




